# Commercial Filming in National and Regional Parks - Global Practice 22 February 2018

The table below investigates commercial filming in national parks in three international film destinations in order to determine how South Africa National Parks compare as a film and production destination. Also included in the table is a regional film destination, Cape Nature Western Cape. The three international benchmark destinations that were chosen are: the Australia, Canada and the United States of America. The international and regional film destinations were analysed in order to determine current practice guidelines and costs for filming in a national park.

- a copy of your public liability cover or a certificate of currency The PLI must be for a minimum of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000)
- The PLI must name the Department as interested parties as per the following text: The Minister for the Environment, the Chief Executive of the Office of Environment and Heritage and the Crown in right of New South Wales
- If approved, the application will be subject to the <u>standard conditions</u> for commercial filming and photography (PDF 137KB) and any additional conditions deemed appropriate to ensure that the activity does not impact on the significance of the area in which it is to be carried out. Additional conditions may relate to matters such as:
  - the type of footwear to be used
  - the number of people on site at any time
  - limits on movement of actors/crew between takes
  - numbers of vehicles on site

#### Other Fees

- \_Additional unforeseen costs (e.g. unplanned time delays, additional supervision incurred after the Agreement is signed)

### **Environmental Management Bond**

NPWS may retain part of or the entire Environmental Management Bond to cover any unexpected costs due to filming.

Any damage caused by the filming over and above the amount of the bond will incur a financial penalty for the cost of restoration work.

- a site needs to be pre-booked (and if it is already booked)
- the filming requires site supervision
- time limits apply at a site.

Advance notice is required as some sites (for instance, those around Sydney Harbour) are very popular and may have multiple bookings of large groups at any one time

- pay park entry fees, site booking fees or supervision fees where they are charged
- notify the local area manager when visiting parks to film.

#### What must be considered in a filming application?

- NPWS will assess all filming applications under this policy and the standard Procedures for Filming Applications (internal document available to staff).
- The FA Act enables a filming activity to be approved even where the activity is prohibited or not permitted under national-parks legislation, including where filming is prohibited in a plan of management.
- The FA Act, NPW Act, Wilderness Act 1987 (Wilderness Act) and EP&A Act provide a range of matters that may need to be considered in assessing an application for filming. The FA Act does not remove the need to consider environmental impacts under Part 5 of the EP&A Act in addition to the considerations provided in the FA Act (that is, the delegated officer must take into account the provisions of both Acts).
- If filming activities are approved under the FA Act (paragraph 1) despite being prohibited under other legislation, the delegated officer will consider all relevant matters in paragraphs 29–38 (for example, heritage, existing rights, wilderness, REFs, Aboriginal consultation) when assessing a filming application. If the applicant has not provided enough information to allow the assessment to be made, the delegated officer may request further information.
- When assessing any filming application the delegated officer must consider:
  - the heritage values of the area
  - the cultural significance of any building or structure that the approval will authorise the use of
  - the park's plan of management.

Commercial filming means the film, electronic, magnetic, digital, or other recording of a moving image by a person, business, or other entity for a market audience with the intent of generating income.  The National Park Service issues filming/photography permits for photography, filming, and associated sound recording to ensure protection of resources, to prevent significant disruption of normal visitor uses, or when projects involve props, models, professional crews and casts or set dressings. Permits are required for access to areas normally closed to the visiting public.  Non-CommercialFilming:Though considered noncommercial, projects such as student films, government-sponsored films, and some non-commercial news media may require a permit to manage the activity to minimize resource damage and reduce conflicts with other users. We may require documentation confirming that these permitted projects are non-commercial in nature. You should submit a completed application along with the application fee to the park where you want to film or photograph as far in advance of your planned date at possible. In addition, you should request a meeting with park staff if your proposed activity is unusual or complex. Early consultation with park staff will help them process the application in a timely manner once it is submitted.  Total processing time varies depending on project complexity. You should submit an application a minimum of 6 weeks in advance of your proposed project start date.  That are the restrictions for filming and photography in ational Parks?  The National Park Service cannot permit a project if:  Damage to natural, cultural, wilderness, and recreational resources is expected which cannot be mitigated;  Other activities are already planned or expected to occur at the same time and place, and filming or photography would be incompatible;  The activity involves access to areas normally closed for reasons of resource protection or safety;  The level of activity within the parks is already so high that staff would be unavailable to work with film crew;

- The project requires access to an area normally closed or restricted to general public use
- Access to an area outside of normal public use hours is required
- The project carries a potential risk to park resources
- The activity raises safety concerns that can be mitigated through issuance of a permit with restrictions
- We would incur additional administrative costs to monitor the activity.

# > Crystal Cave Location Fees

Private tour - \$275

Certificate of Liability Insurance: Submit a valid Liability Insurance Certificate with your application package. The policy should be in the amount of \$1,000,000 and must be underwritten by a United States company naming the United States of America as additionally insured.

- The project includes a portrayal of activities that are not permitted within a national park;
- The production company is unwilling or unable to obtain necessary insurance;
- The production company is unwilling or unable to reimburse the National Park Service for costs or comply with National Park Service bond requirements.

#### What activities are prohibited?

- Activities having the potential to significantly impact, alter, or damage our resources are prohibited. The following are also prohibited:
- Altering, damaging or removing vegetation or filming in wetlands
- Vehicle use off established roads and parking areas
- Use of insecticides, herbicides, and pesticides
- Loud noises (60 decibels or higher) between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- Use of meadow areas except on trails or already disturbed areas as determined by the NPS
- Any artificial lighting or use of power equipment in wilderness (other wilderness restrictions apply)
- Filming of wild animals in captivity (except when working with our wildlife management operations)
- Aerial filming, including drones (highly restricted)
- Smoking in buildings, on boardwalks, or in vegetated areas
- Harassment of wildlife or introduction of wildlife captured elsewhere
- Commercial filming in wilderness areas
- Use of equipment that inhibits public views of popular scenic vistas
- Digging, scraping, chiseling, or defacing natural features for filming purposes.

#### > What if I'd like to film or photograph Crystal Cave?

- Crystal Cave is managed by our non-profit partner The Sequoia Parks Conservancy (SPC). If you're interested in filming or photographing at Crystal Cave, contact them to g make arrangements for a private tour in advance of applyingfor an NPS permit. You can email them or call <u>559-565-</u> 4251.
- The private tour fee is \$275.00 to be paid directly to SPC. A maximum of 10 people are allowed in the cave for film or photography purposes.

#### > When and how do I pay my permit fees?

 Once your application is received and determined to be complete, you will be directed to pay the application fee of

				\$150. If your application is likely to be approved and proceeds through the permitting phase, you will be invoiced the full cost recovery amount after those costs have been determined.  Payments will be made via pay.gov and require you to input a permit application number. Our office will contact you with further instructions once your application package has been received.  *NOTE: Payment of the permit application fee does not guarantee that a permit will be granted; only that your application will be further reviewed. The fee must be paid before the application will be fully reviewed and considered for permitting.  What other locations might better suit my commercial filming or photography needs?  Balch Park through Tulare County Film Commission, Sequoia National Forest & Giant Sequoia National Monument, Sierra National Forest, and Inyo National Forest are all regional options for filming and photography which may have fewer restrictions. All areas except Inyo feature giant sequoias. Though it lacks giant sequoias, Inyo features dramatic mountain views on the eastern side of the Sierra.  https://www.nps.gov/seki/getinvolved/filmfaq.htm

Insurance: Short-term policies must show coverage on an "occurrence" basis. Required commercial liability for video or film productions companies is generally one million dollars (\$1.000.000), but will vary according to project scope, risk to park resources and other relevant circumstances. Additional amounts may be required for high-risk activities. All insurance certificates must be issued by an insurance company operating in the United States. The Filming Coordinator must receive the insurance certificate no later than one week before the scheduled activity.

#### Detailed Fee Schedule Below:

#### The filming program fee schedule is as follows:

- \$100 non-refundable Application Fee (mentioned above) A \$100 nonrefundable application fee must accompany each complete filming application. This fee is based on an average of two hours to provide initial review of an application. Since some projects require more than two hours to consider and others take less, the \$100 application fee is an average cost for the initial time involved in reviewing a project. The fee includes time spent answering initial inquiries, initial review of an application, and basic technical consultation. If this process takes longer than 2 hours, a fee of \$65 per hour per staff member management fee will apply in addition to the initial \$100 application fee.
- \$300 Administrative Fee- Once a request is approved, this fee covers the costs associated with issuing a simple permit. This includes, but is not limited to. processing fees, permit development, consultations with the permittee, managerial and/or technical consultations and billing. This fee covers a maximum of four hours administrative time needed to process a simple permit. Any administrative time needed above and beyond four hours to issue and manage a permit will be charged an hourly fee of \$65 per hour.

#### Restrictions

- Drone use is prohibited
- Filming is restricted at Mather Point
- Filming in wilderness areas is restricted

## Exemptions

- Visitors engaged in filming/photography intended for their personal use and enjoyment
- Filming of breaking news (an event that cannot be covered at any other time or location) by news crews
- Projects requiring only aerial filming from a helicopter or fixed-wing airplane (more information on the Filming Guidelines page)
- Filming that is conducted pursuant to a cooperative agreement or contract with the National Park Service

#### Prohibited Activities –

- Activities having the potential to damage or significantly impact or alter park resources are prohibited. The following is a partial list of prohibited activities: (1) altering, damaging or removing vegetation. (2) vehicle use off established roads and parking areas. (3) use of insecticides, herbicides and pesticides. (4) loud noises that exceed 60 decibels or have the potential to negatively impact park resources or visitors experience. (5) smoking in buildings or in vegetated areas, (6) use of fragile vegetation areas, except on trails or already disturbed areas (as determined by NPS), (7) writing on or discoloring any natural feature or structure.
- Photographic licenses such as, but not limited to, the **11** superimposing of pictures which depict activities in conflict with the mission and goals of park management are prohibited. Staged activities by onscreen talent that would be considered dangerous if performed by the general public is also prohibited. Activities that are illegal in the park, such as hunting and off-road travel, are not to be depicted.
- Harassment of wildlife is prohibited by law. Filming of wildlife is permitted as long as there is NO disturbance. feeding, teasing, or manipulation of resident or free-

- Hourly Management Fee- A \$65 per hour rate applies primarily under the following conditions:
  - Monitoring-Filming activities authorized by permit may require continuous. on-site supervision by the NPS to assure full compliance with all conditions of the permit. Monitoring will be charged at the rate of \$45 per hour per staff member with a minimum of two hours per staff member, per day. The scope and complexity of the filming activity will determine the level and type of supervision. Fees may include travel time for employees involved between filming location(s) and employee duty station(s).
  - Interviews All interviews of park personnel will be assessed at the hourly rate. This will not apply to pre-approved filming or photographing of NPS staff members performing their regularly scheduled work activities.
  - Scouting- If a permittee requests a scouting trip with or by the Filming Permits Coordinator: staff time will be assessed at a rate of \$65 per hour
  - Extended Administrative Time- This fee covers additional administrative time needed beyond the maximum four hours covered by the \$300 Administrative Fee. This rate does not preclude any of the other fees and is applied per hour, per staff member. Any filming activity that is particularly complex is subject to the \$65 hourly fee.

- Performance Bonds All permitted filming activities will require the permittee to post a performance bond. The purpose of the bond is to insure that the resource is left in as good condition as it was prior to the filming, and to cover restoration costs (if needed). The amount of the bond will be determined according to the scope and potential for damage by the activity. At the conclusion of the permit the bond will be returned to the permittee after final billing costs and costs of necessary clean up: repair or rehabilitation is deducted. The performance bond can be in the form of a money order; cashiers check or above listed credit cards
- Sharing the Park A filming or photography permit does not give exclusive rights to the permittee or allow the permittee to restrict visitors from any location. Locations that attract a large number of visitors will be avoided. Normal visitor use patterns will not be interrupted for longer than five minutes, and only as specified in the approved permit. Filming or photography permit activities may not occur simultaneously with other permitted activities unless authorized by the NPS, or unduly conflict with scheduled park activities such as interpretive presentations. Visitors will be allowed to observe filming activity.
- Restrictions and Conditions These will be enumerated in the permit. The following activities are restricted and must be approved on a case by case basis: (1) use of children or animals. (2) discharge of blank ammunition and all black powder weapons. (3) mechanical or pyrotechnic special effects. (4) stunts. (5) amplified music or sound. (6) placing of large set dressings, (7) filming photography inside interiors of government administrative work areas, (8) film equipment or activities on roadways. (9) access to closed areas or access to areas during non-visitor use hours. The permit will specify the number of people and the exact types of equipment allowed. The NPS 12 monitor on duty will not allow activities not specified in the permit. Please note that the permit does not include authority to film or photograph park visitors unless agreed to by the visitor and a signed written release is obtained by the permittee.
- Closures Permit activities may be restricted based on weather or seasonal conditions (fire danger, standing water after rain, wildlife nesting season, etc.). Additional closures, use limits and/or restricted activities are listed in the superintendent's Compendium, which is available at www.nps.gov or upon

#### Prohibited Activities –

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- Photographic licenses such as, but not limited to, the superimposing of pictures which depict activities in conflict with the mission and goals of park management are prohibited. Staged activities by on-screen talent that would be considered dangerous if performed by the general public is also prohibited. Activities that are illegal in the park, such as hunting and off-road travel, are not to be depicted.
- Harassment of wildlife is prohibited by law. Filming of wildlife is permitted as long as there is NO disturbance, feeding, teasing, or manipulation of resident or freeroaming animals. Wildlife captured elsewhere may NOT be used in any in-park filming, whether trained or not.
- Aerial Filming Aerial filming must comply with all applicable provisions of Special Federal Aviation Regulation 50-2 and Federal Aviation Regulation 93, Subpart U ("Special Flight Rules in the Vicinity of Grand Canyon National Park AZ"), which does not allow flights below the canyon rim. For additional information on aerial filming, please contact the Filming Permits Coordinator, Grand Canyon National Park, at 928-638-7779 or the Federal Aviation Administration, Flight Standards District Office at 702-269-1445.
- Termination of Permit All filming or photography permits issued by the National Park Service are "revocable" on 24 hours notice or WITHOUT NOTICE if the terms of the permit are violated. Deliberate infractions of the terms of the filming permit or the deliberate making of false or misleading statements concerning intended actions in order to obtain a permit are causes for immediate termination of the permit and cause for possible prosecution. Permits will be revoked if damage to resources or facilities is threatened, of if there is a clear danger to public health or safety.

Details of some of these unique film locations  Matjiesrivier Nature Reserve filming  A number of international and local productions have utilised Matjiesrivier Nature Reserve as a film location. With magnificent landscapes, and unique rock formations such as the Stadsaal Caves, Matjiesrivier is a versatile shooting location.  Grootvadersbosch Nature Reserve Filming  With pristine indigenous forest, amazing Redwoods, and remarkable vistas, there are numerous opportunities for filming in this reserve.  Located just over three hours from Cape Town, near the towns of Swellendam and Heidelberg, the reserve is conveniently located for film shoots.  Keurbooms River Nature Reserve Filming  Six hours from Cape Town, on the scenic Garden Route toward Nature's Valley, lies the Keurbooms River Nature Reserve.  It is just six kilometres outside of the popular tourist destination of Plettenberg Bay. A variety of habitats are conserved in the reserve, such as the relatively unspoilt riverine gorge and patches of Knysna forest along the flood banks. Swartberg Nature Reserve Filming  The Swartberg Nature Reserve is teeming with a rich history and is perhaps best known as Gamkaskloof — a small settlement established there in 1830 by farmers of European origin. Entirely self-sufficient, the community of Gamkaskloof lived in isolation for over a century. The first road into Die Hel, as it is known, was only built in 1962. 		It's an area of climatic extremes where winters are characterised by vast snow-capped mountains while summer days reach high temperatures. The Swartberg Pass is a wildly popular setting for both photographers and filmmakers.  De Hoop Nature Reserve Filming
		De Hoop lies at the southernmost tip of Africa, where mountains meet the sea and create a fusion between freshwater and marine habitats that support a staggering array of terrestrial and aquatic life. Encompassing roughly 34 000 hectares, this World Heritage Site is one of the largest natural areas managed by CapeNature.
		Annually, between July and November, southern right whales make their epic journey back to the safety of these rich waters to mate and calve — a spectacular site to witness. With many large mammals (most notably the rare bontebok and Cape mountain zebra) and a great diversity of birds, the reserve has also become well known for supporting the only breeding colony of Cape vultures left in the Western Cape.
