CURRENCY:

FOREIGN EXCHANGE:

It is important to note that you can only pay in Rands in South Africa. Money can be exchanged at the airport, commercial banks, Rennies Travel and American Express. These can be found in most shopping centres in the Western Cape. You may also find exchange facilities in some hotels.

Banking hours are: 9am – 3.30pm (weekdays)

and $8.30 \, \mathrm{am} - 11 \mathrm{am}$ (Saturdays) and are closed on Sundays and Public Holidays.

All major credit cards are accepted at most establishments in the Western Cape.

DUTY FREE SHOPPING

All stores must charge the Value Added Tax (VAT) of 15% that is levied on the purchase of most goods in South Africa. As a foreign visitor you may apply for a refund of the VAT you pay while in the country provided you apply before you depart.

Ensure that you receive your tax receipts for all purchases made, to claim your VAT refund, present all your tax receipts to the VAT administrator at your point of departure.

BUSINESS HOURS

Shops at the major malls such as the V&A Waterfront and Canal Walk are open until 9pm everyday, while the shops in shopping centres close at 7pm. Informal traders and flea markets generally trade from 9pm - 4pm. Muslim owned businesses are closed between 12pm and 2pm on Fridays.

SAFETY TIPS

Avoid walking in deserted and dark places at night.

Never allow strangers to assist you in any way at ATMs.

At night, park in a secure and well-lit area with street guards. Keep photocopies and all valuable documents in a safe place.

DRINKING WATER

Drinking water in South Africa is safe to drink and cook with when taken from taps in urban areas. Not all tap water in rural areas is safe for consumption, so take precautions if necessary.





Must-do Experience

The Test Kitchen

One of the country's top restaurants, The Test Kitchen is based at the Old Biscuit Mill in Woodstock and is the brainchild of award-winning chef, Luke Dale-Roberts. While the restaurant is renowned for its menu, the venue is not uptight or overly elaborate. The experiences take you around the world, starting off in the Dark Room, before finishing up with the full taster and wine flight experience in the Light Room. This is more than a meal, it's an experience. Booking essential.

The Western Cape is a place known for its abundance of quality wine and the Cape, in particular, is intrinsically tied to the vine. Nowhere is this truer than in the Cape Winelands, a region overflowing with award-winning vintages and home to a number of world class vinevards

Towns such as Stellenbosch, Franschhoek, Paarl, Wellington and Robertson are now iconic in terms of the wine they produce and together they produce wine that is as diverse as it is bountiful. Set aside plenty of time if you visit the Cape Winelands, because you will never cover it in a day...

But while the wine put the Cape Winelands on the map, it delivers plenty on the food front as well, with world class restaurants in abundance, with Franschhoek and Stellenbosch, in particular, leading the way. Both towns are home to a number of award-winning restaurants, ranging from fine dining to more relaxed experiences.

And you can add craft beer and whisky to the menu now, with the region quickly becoming a leader in both, ensuring that it continues to expand on what it has to offer.

Must-do experience:

Garden Tour at Babylonstoren

Babylonstoren's daily guided garden tour starts at the Farm Shop at 10am. One of the experienced gardeners will be your guide on this tour, during which guests are encouraged to pick, taste, smell and touch while walking through the garden. Each of the 300 plant varieties is edible or has medicinal value. The beautiful garden is not only pleasing to the eye, but also provides the restaurants with fresh produce, harvested daily. Babylonstoren's enthusiastic guides will share some of the garden's special stories with you and give practical gardening tips.



Cape Karoo

Known for its wide-open spaces, the Cape Karoo is where you want to go when the pace of city life is something you want to escape. This is where you go to get off the grid.

A place of incredible beauty, wild game, clear skies and magical sunsets, the Cape Karoo has a number of Nature Reserves and game farms, boasting an abundance of wildlife. The Karoo National Park, for example, is home to black rhino, lions, and other wild game.

Another animal in abundance in the Karoo is sheep, who roam 'freely' around the area on large plots of land, sampling a wide range of indigenous, aromatic plants. As a result, the Karoo has become famous for its succulent and tasty lamb dishes. You need to sample some when in

Perhaps the best way to see this ancient land is by train, with the luxurious Rovos Rail running through the area, as well as the more affordable Premier Classe, Blue Train and Shosholoza trains. What better way to see this magical place than by train?

While in the area, be sure to visit Matjiesfontein, a tiny 19th Century town, seemingly untouched by time, and was once considered the jewel of the Western Cape.

Must-do experience:

Stargazing:

Stargazing is a must when visiting anywhere in the Cape Karoo it only takes you to look up and view stars pinned against a black canvas. From open vast landscapes, to sunsets followed by open starry night skies. The Cape Karoo is an untouched region just waiting to be discovered by you.

Cape Overberg

Lying between the Cape Peninsula and the Garden Route, the Cape Overberg is known as the 'breadbasket' of the Cape, because of its wheat fields and large harvest of fruits.

This is a place that boasts great diversity with coastal towns such as Hermanus, known as the jewel of the Cape Whale Coast for its abundance of marine wildlife, the beautiful Elgin Valley, an under-appreciated wine region and Swellendam, a jaw-dropping beautiful natural wonderland, combing to create a region unlike any other. With a land-scape dominated by gentle, undulating hills, enclosed by the ocean and foreboding mountain ranges, the Cape Overberg is a favourite getaway for those seeking outdoor pursuits and adventure.

The region also boasts an abundance of animal life – both land and ocean dwelling – with the wild horses that roam the wetlands between Bot River and Kleinmond having been there for as long as people can remember and Hermanus a favourite breeding ground for the Southern Right whale. Visit the coastal town from May to October and you're virtually guaranteed a sighting of these magnificent ocean animals.

Walker Bay, meanwhile, produces the country's most southerly wine, while the region boasts fantastic seafood, artisanal cheeses, and much more for which to pair it with.

Must-do experience:

Shark Cage Diving in Gansbaai

Shark cage diving is the best way to experience one of the ocean's most majestic, and feared, predators up close. Easily one of the most popular activities for those visiting Cape Town and the Western Cape, the small town of Gansbaai is arguably the best place to view these incredible animals. Known as 'Shark Alley', Dyer Island just off Gansbaai is a hot spot for viewing Great White sharks, giving you an opportunity to look them – and your fears – in the eye...





Cape West Coast

The Cape West Coast (Weskus) is a place so awe-inspiring, so jaw-droppingly beautiful, and so magical, you would need weeks to take it all in. Stretching from Malmesbury, just outside of Cape Town, to the border of the Northern Cape at Touws River, the Cape West Coast is best known for its beautiful beaches and the quaint, seaside towns that populate the region.

Town such as Langebaan, Lambert's Bay, Paternoster and Saldanha have all become a home-away-from-home for many Western Cape locals and are havens for those looking to escape the city.

The region is also famous for its bountiful seafood, with snoek, mussels and crayfish in abundance and understandably the area has become a mecca for restaurants specialising in seafood dishes, the ingredients of which are usually fresh form the ocean in which they line.

But the Cape West Coast is not just about the sea and all things related to it! There are many wonders that lie inland with the aptly named town of Darling famous for its wildflowers, which are in full bloom over September, and its locally produced wines, while the Cederberg Mountains boast century-old rock art, warm, welcoming locals and some of the best hiking, mountain biking and bouldering in the world.

Must-do experience:

Rocklands Bouldering

Situated in the Cederberg Mountains, Rocklands is a beautiful area in a semi-desert setting. Famous for it's world class bouldering, there are a large variety of quality climbing options in both bouldering and sport climbing. All the sport routes are single pitch and you will have to do a small amount of walking to get to the different areas. Most of the original climbing is situated on CapeNature land and thus day or week permits must be obtained as permits for bouldering are not covered by Wild Cards. Depending on the time of year you visit, the Weskus can get pretty hot, so take along plenty of water.

Garden Route and Klein Karoo

One the most beautiful, diverse and awe-inspiring regions in the country, the Garden Route and Klein Karoo is also one of the most-loved road trips to embark on. Stretching from Witsand to Plettenberg Bay, right around to Oudtshoorn as well as Calitzdorp and Ladismith on the world-renowned Route 62, this is a place where adventure lies around every corner.

With everything from majestic mountains – and equally impressive mountain passes – to brilliantly blue coastlines and thick forested areas, the region is a natural wonderland to explore with a hugely diverse number of experiences.

Route 62 runs through some fantastic small towns, with a number of options available to you – from olive and fruit farms, lesser-known, but equally impressive wineries, and nature reserves.

And while the Garden Route is often celebrated for its exquisite coastal beauty, brilliant beaches and marvellous lagoons, it is also a golfer's paradise with a number of world class courses on offer, including Fancourt and Pinnacle Point, with many designed by world famous golfers.

For the adventurous, there are few better playgrounds to explore, with a myriad of trails, running through indigenous forests and up epic, jaw-dropping passes, while for those who prefer the water are sure to be spoilt by what is on offer in Knysna, Wilderness and Plettenberg

Must-do experience:

The Cango Caves

The Cango Caves are an iconic site and are both a cultural and natural landmark in South Africa. Dated to be around 20-millions years old, the caves are situated in the Swartberg Mountains, 30km outside of town, and are roughly one kilometre in length.



Those massive and monolithic mountains going by the name of Cederberg are possibly the reason why you've decided to mission north along the N7, but let's face it; you're going to have to take a break before entering this gigantic sandstone playground and Clanwilliam is perfectly perched on the edge of this wilderness. Endemic rooibos and buchu tea flourish on the harsh Cederberg slopes, in stark contrast with the verdant valley carved by the Olifants River far below and its snaking irrigation canals sustaining extensive citrus farming. Come spring time the air is suffused with the scent of orange blossoms.

Town 5: Springbok

Set in a narrow valley bisecting the granite domes of the Klein Koperberge (small copper mountains), is the principal town of Namakwa, Springbok. Shortened from Springbokfontein in 1911, it owes its existence to copper-mining undertaken after 1850 and a ready supply of water. In the late 1870s, rich copper deposits at Okiep saw most Springbok residents following their dreams to drought-stricken claims, many of which returned.

Town 6: Vioolsdrift

The official border post to Namibia. There are several camp sites on the banks of the Orange River. Many river rafting trips along the Orange and through the Richtersveld start here. Stunning rock stratum and petroglyphs can be viewed. Once alone Nama man lived here, whose name was Jan Viool. He would guide travellers through the river at the shallowest part called a "drif", hence the name "Vioolsdrif". Only in 1956 the bridge was built across the river, linking Vioolsdrift to the Namibian border town of Noordoewer on the northern banks of the Orange.

Founded in 1860 by the Rhenish Mission Society and named after Johan Keetman, the town still retains vestiges of its original German buildings. The stone mission church, built in 1895, is now a museum with displays depicting the region's colourful past. Housed in the old Post Office building (built in 1910) is the Southern Tourism Forum.

Visit the statue of Hosea Kutako, a nationalist hero, in the gardens surrounding the Tintenpalast, the seat of the Namibian legislature, or chow down on ostrich kebab or zebra steak at Joe's Beerhouse before leaving on a safari into the Namibian wilderness.

The Cross Cape Cycle Route is the perfect way to see the Western Cape. Stretching from Plettenberg Bay on the Garden Route to Stellenbosch in the Cape Winelands, you will challenged by long, steep climbs and rewarded with fast descents into lush, green valleys.

The Western Cape is currently in a drought and while some regions are worse effected than others, please remember to be water wise, save a like a local, and of course, travel responsibly. This seven-day itinerary below highlights areas most effected by the current drought and we suggest when, and where, to stock up on fluids and when to carry in with you.

Be mindful, be aware, and please, be responsible.

Day 1

Plettenberg Bay to Knysna: 80km

Begin your trip in the coastal town of Plettenberg Bay and enjoy dinner at Enrico's Italian restaurant, to get in some much-needed carbs the night before. You will need them!

Your first day of riding will be a good sign of what to expect for the duration of your stay. Steep climbs – a mix of tar and dirt – to start you off, before your legs are given a rest on some fast downhill sections. Keep an eye out for the notoriously shy elephants that roam the indigenous forest, before taking on one last big climb and then an epic downhill stretch into Knysna.

Once in Knysna, make sure you put your feet up for a bit before heading out to dinner at the Cruise Café located at the Knysna Waterfront.

Day 2

Knysna to George: 80km

Start your ride with Knsyna Lagoon at your shoulder, before turning off onto some gentle jeep track ahead of some seriously big climbs. This section of the route offers a great mix of indigenous forest, dairy farms, and country roads, before finishing up in the town of George. Make sure you book a room at Fancourt Golf Estate. Book some time in the spa, enjoy some drinks at the Club House, before finally heading down to La Cantina for dinner and an early night. Fuel up in the morning with a fabulous buffet breakfast at La Cantina before heading back to your bike and the trails!

Day 3

George to Oudtshoorn: 80km

You are about to leave the lush, green forests behind you as you enter the drier, but no-less beautiful Klein Karoo. Steel yourself for the climb up the majestic Montagu Pass, which will certainly drain the legs, but also reward you with magnificent views and lush ferny vegetation. Of course, what comes up, must come down, and the second half of this section is far more forgiving than the first.

Once in Oudtshoorn book yourself in at the Buffelsdrift Game Lodge and make sure you try out the luxury tented accommodation, which is perfect for a rugged traveller like yourself. And if you're up for it — we know you will be — enjoy an evening game drive, where you are guaranteed to see some of the fabled Big Five animals. Finally, enjoy a sumptuous meal at the Bello Cibo restaurant before retiring for the night.

Day 4

Oudtshoorn to Rooiberg: 127km

The vegetation spreads out on this section of the route and best you be prepared for a long day in the saddle. The Rooiberg Pass will be your big challenge for the day – if you choose to take it on – an 11km climb on loose, rough terrain. If it rains, it could be an even longer day than you prepared for, but never fear, there is a magic lodge nestled in the mountain – perfect for you to put your feet up after a tough day of riding.

Accommodation for the night is at the fantastic Ra Molopo Lodge where you can enjoy fine dining on lavish buffets or a la Carte in the restaurant for breakfast, lunch or dinner. In summer, have your dinner on the deck, before reliving the day's riding around a moonlit campfire.

Day 5

Rooiberg to Swellendam: 169km

Have a hearty breakfast before leaving Rooiberg, because this is the longest section of the route and we would recommend you consider hopping on and off here – it's a tough ride with some long stretches of road. But it's not without its rewards, including the fantastic section through the Duiwenhoks Valley and a ride-by of the oldest farmhouses in the district. The tar road from Suurbraak to Swellendam offers a welcome respite at the end of the day.

After a long day in the saddle, you will want some real downtime and A Log Home in Swellendam will give you just that. Off the grid, this self-catering log home is the perfect stopover, with a small pool to soak your weary feet, a comfortable sitting area and a lovely outside area, complete with a big fire pit for cooking. Here you can truly put your feet up with nobody to bother you as you unwind after your big ride.

Day 6

Swellendam to Greyton: 106km

Follow the Breede River, across rolling terrain, through grain fields, before turning off to follow the Riviersonderend River towards Greyton. Swellendam is famed for its natural beauty and eateries along the main road and we would advise taking your time to soak it all in. Be sure to make a pit stop at Die Ou Meul pie shop for a vital refuel before flying into the finish line.

Greyton is a lovely little town, with wonderful warmth of character and welcoming hosts. Your accommodation for the night – the Post House – has a great bar on site where you can enjoy a couple of drinks before heading down to Searle's Trading Post for dinner. The restaurant is about 100 metres down the stretch, so even your tired legs will make it with time to spare.

Day 7

Greyton to Stellenbosch: 107km

If you've made it this far without hopping off, congratulations, you're a biking machine and clearly up for the challenge. This section of the route has a fair bit of tar and two iconic passes for you to get over – the Franschhoek Pass and Hellshoogte (aptly named we assure you). Make sure you sample some coffee and cuisine in the town of Franschhoek, before summiting and free-wheeling down into Stellenbosch for a well-earned rest.

Nestled between the Cape Peninsula and the Garden Route, the Cape Overberg is a place of unsurpassed beauty, fondly referred to as the 'breadbasket of the Cape' due to its bountiful harvests of wheat and fruit. The latest addition to the Cape Cycle Route network, The Overberg Meander, is an exploration of a region that is a playground for those seeking adventure and the great outdoors.

Made up of towns such as Swellendam, Cape Agulhas, Elim, Hermanus and Grabouw, the Cape Overberg boasts a landscape that is dominated by gentle, undulating hills, deep, green grass and golden wheat fields enclosed by the ocean and foreboding mountain ranges, making for great adventure activities.

Swellendam to L'Agulhas

Swellendam is one of the oldest towns in South Africa, set against the backdrop of the gorgeous Langeberg Mountains. Visit Wlidebraam Berry Estate for some liquor tasting before making your way along undulating gravel roads, wheat fields, and sun-kissed canola fields in bloom from the start of July, up until mid-October.

En-route to L'Agulhas – the southern-most point in Africa – make a detour into Bredasdorp for a quick dip in the Breede River, before refilling your water bottles and replenishing your supplies. Take caution on the tarred road between Bredasdorp and Struisbaai and stay in single-file.

Once through Struisbaai, stop for a mandatory selfie at the Southern-most point of Africa, which is also where the Indian and Atlantic Ocean meet. Refuel with the local food and get some well-deserved rest.

L'Agulhas to Napier

This section of the Overberg Meander is made up pre-dominantly of gravel roads, periodically broken up by a few, short sections of tarred roads. The lovely little town of Elim – which was first established as a Moravian Mission Station in 1824 – is a logical halfway stop for replenishing your supplies.

Make sure you stop off at one of the wine estates along the Elim Wine Route. The route is made up of six wineries – Zoetendal Winery, Quoin Rock, The Berrio, Black Oystercatcher Strandveld Vineyards, home of First Sighting wines and Lomond – and they boast some delicious red, white and rosé wines.

Turning onto Elim road, you will encounter the first "climbs" of the day, surrounded by stretches of unspoilt fynbos (natural shrub land), before rolling past wheat and barley fields into the town of Napier – your home for the evening.

Napier to Tesselaarsdal

Depart Napier in a westerly direction, making sure to keep an eye out for the turnoff to Sandy's Glen, which is roughly 11km out of town on the R316. A sharp left off the tarred road leads to an immediate climb into the fynbos strewn mountains of the Cape Overberg.

This 80km ride is made up of detours and possible options for you to cycle. Although not officially part of the Overberg Meander, Stanford is too good of an opportunity to pass up, with craft beer, wine, coffee, artisanal gin and food stops in abundance. Re-fuel your tired body before climbing the short and punchy Akkedis Pass, a 7km tarred climb

on the R326. Turn off the tarred road once again in a westerly direction before embarking on more climbing, which will take you up and over the road into the Hemel-en-Aarde Valley and your base for the night.

Tesselaarsdal to Elgin Valley

This is arguably the toughest section of the route, but also the most scenic, taking you past award winning vineyards of the Hemel-en-Aarde valley. You will have the option to detour into the bustling coastal town of Hermanus, or the second optional detour via the protected Kogelberg Biosphere Reserve, which forms part of the Cape Floral Kingdom a UNESCO World Heritage Site and ending up in the picturesque valley of Elgin.

Ensure that you are well rested before you take on the rough and corrugated Highlands road climb, which will reward you with panoramic vistas extending over the Cape Whale Coast, as well as the Groenlandberg mountains.

Stop off at the iconic Peregrine Farm Stall and reward yourself with a freshly baked pie and artisanal coffee or fresh pressed apple juice, before crossing the N2 highway on your way to the Elgin Railway Market that takes places every Saturday and also where you will end your Overberg Meander journey.

Ensure that you are well rested before you take on the rough and corrugated Highlands road climb, which will reward you with panoramic vistas extending over the Cape Whale Coast, as well as the Groenlandberg mountains.

Cycle Tour 364 takes you over 123.3km through all the trendiest Cape Town hotspots, over Chapman's Peak to the Cape Point Nature Reserve, and back again all in one day. Filled with awe-inspiring views, intense hill climbs and unforgettable adventures.

Waterfront to Hout Bay

As you leave the V&A Waterfront development it is prudent to keep the ocean to your immediate right and not at all a bad idea to use the bike path/ sidewalk for as long as possible. This will take you all along the Atlantic seaboard promenade past the Mouille Point Lighthouse and through Sea Point. The road is narrow as you pass through trendy Bantry Bay, Clifton and Camps Bay, with their popular beaches, restaurants and bars. You then find yourself following along the base of the Twelve Apostles until it rises up and over the Nek at Llandudno. The Valley of Hout Bay opens up in front of you as crest and the ride down and through the village to the beach offers numerous opportunities to be distracted.

Hout Bay to Brakkekloof

With the beach stretching out to your right you begin the climb up spectacular Chapman's Peak Drive. It hugs the mountain and seems to be tacked onto the cliff face as you round the top and descend the other side. Just as you think it cannot get any better, the views of Noordhoek Beach stretching into the distance are guaranteed to take your breath away. From here the road is flat all the way to the Sun Valley/ Brakkekloof intersection which marks the end of this section.

Brakkekloof to Cape Point Gate

From the Sun Valley/Brakkekloof intersection you climb up Black Hill for the first glimpse of False Bay at Glencarin. Then it's on to Simon's Town, which has a long naval history, made apparent by the dated gun placements As you approach this quaint Victorian-looking town, complete with pubs, fish and chip shops and tea rooms, the road winds past Boulders Beach and its famous penguin colony The trees on the golf course give a good indication as to the prevalent wind direction. The final Smitswinkel climb, Cape Point can be seen stretching out ahead of you. At the top of this incline is the entrance to the Cape Point Nature Reserve

Cape Point Gate to Brakkekloof

Baboons are often seen foraging along the road on this section. The wind either blows from behind or into your face. The road swoops down past Scarborough, where you once again reach the coast. It is truly sublime riding through Misty Cliffs. There are some choice surfing spots all along here. The final hill climbs up the back of Kommetjie, and its landmark Slanghoek lighthouse. Then it's down through the village, before the long straight past Ocean View and Masiphumelele, and back to the Sun Valley/Brakkekloof intersection.

Brakkekloof to Hout Bay

From Brakkekloof/Sun Valley intersection it is a flat cruise to Noordhoek Village, nestled against the side of the mountain. Here you could easily swap your bike for a horse and gallop across the beach. Or just enjoy coffee and eat delicious pastries at the Noordhoek Farm Village, which boasts a number of restaurants and shops. Chapman's Peak Drive starts with a preliminary hill opening, up vistas, down Long Beach, and back to Kommetije. Before turning the corner and starting the more substantial climb of the course, with dramatic drop-offs to the ocean below. Look out for surfers and the shark spotter who keeps vigil. This is a most worthy and memorable climb and the descent to Hout Bay is truly exhilarating.

Hout Bay to Waterfront

The infamous Suikerbossie climb out of Hout Bay is quite busy, but has a good wide shoulder. The exclusive beach suburb of Llandudno offers up a panoramic ocean view. It is complemented by the sight of Lion's Head and the back of Table Mountain as you continue on towards Camps Bay. The vibrancy of city life is evident as you pass the beaches and eateries and private balconies of this Riviera-like part of Cape Town. As you reach Sea Point it is a good idea to slow down and meander along the bike signposted V&A Waterfront, where your journey ends.

Cederberg Circuit takes you over 247km through winding historical mountain passes, past crystal clear rivers and unique nature reserves. This route can be done in 3 – 6 days.

Citrusdal to Algeria

Leaving Citrusdal, the Ou Kaapse Pad takes you out on the eastern bank of the Olifant's River. It's easy and flat for a time, winding between the green orchards of the citrus farms that dominate the economy in this area. Just 20km out, you pass by the oldest orange tree in the southern hemisphere. You might consider a swim at the low-level bridge off to the left at 27km, as the temperatures around here can soar upwards of 50°C. At the Clanwilliam dam you turn right up the Rondegat River Valley and start climbing all the way to Algeria. This brings you to the Cape Nature campsite, where you can buy hiking permits and check into comfortable accommodation. Look out for a change in the road surface as it unexpectedly turns to brick paving for the last few kms, to the base of Uitkyk Pass.

Uitkyk Pass to Mount Ceder

From the end of the paved road, the Uitkyk Pass rises sharply and winds spectacularly up the side of the mountain. As you hit the top you can get your last cell phone signal. While you make that final call, you can gaze over the majestic mountain peaks to the north or down the Driehoek valley to the south. The next section presents a fairly rough road surface all the way to Cederberg Cellars for 96km. There is a small shop and wine tasting is on offer - it's well worth a visit. 3km farther there is a right turn, and the road rises sharply before dropping down a steep descent to Kromrviier resort where you can swim in the stream and order an ice-cold beverage. As you pass through the gates be sure not to end up in the same pen as the Anatolian sheep dog, as he is a little protective. There are some cave paintings off to the right at Truitjieskraal. but you will need a permit, which is obtainable at the farm. From here there is still a 5km climb before heading down to Mount Ceder Resort.

Mount Ceder to Op Die Berg

From Mount Ceder, on the banks of the Grootrivier, there is a 5km descent, which you zoomed down yesterday. Today, however, you will be climbing 5km to get out of the Blinkberg Pass, between the Skurweberge and the Swartruggens mountains. As the land flattens somewhat there are beautiful rock formations seemingly scattered about with innumerable 'gargoyles' keeping watch. The road now turns to tar and the pace picks up all the way to the T-Junction, where the Op Die Berg village is to the left and the route continues to the right.

Op Die Berg to Citrusdal

The first 40km is on tar and is relatively flat, but this is the Koue Bokkeveld and is not for the faint hearted. It can be hellishly hot or freezing cold, and if there is a headwind it can be really tough. As the mountains close in from both sides, the road turns to gravel and winds howl through a narrow valley before you climb the Middelberg Pass. The views across to Middelberg Peak, Meulenskop and the Elandkloof valley are brilliant. Easily as good as the descent, which is often rough and skittish. One should take care on the tar road, which is a screamer all the way into Citrusdal and the finish.

Day 2

Discover where we came from: Discover the origins of human culture

Africa is the continent that gave birth to humankind. Some of the oldest human fossil bones were discovered in Gauteng province, South Africa, in an area north of Johannesburg now called the Cradle of Humankind.

While the dawn of biological humankind began in the limestone caves of northern Gauteng, our human story continued and developed more south, in the Western Cape province. It is here that we have some of the first evidence of humans starting to explore their potential for social, behavioural and cultural innovation. Archaeological evidence shows that this was one of the first places where our ancestors worked with fire to create better tools, where we started regularly eating seafood that may have allowed for our brains to develop, and where we started to express ourselves creatively and express spirituality.

This is where our modern-day culture began and where our ancestors started shaping our future through their behaviours.

This is the Cradle of Human Culture, and it's not just a place or even a destination, but a journey of self-discovery.

A trip to the Cradle of Human Culture in the Western Cape does not start or end with these three sites only. The evolution of our human culture can be experienced across the whole province. So take a road trip and time travel through the Western Cape. Then experience the present and immerse yourself in the incredible collection of contemporary African art at the Zeitz MOCAA at the V&A Waterfront in Cape Town. These are just a few of the many amazing attractions in the Cradle of Human Culture that will fascinate you and change the way you see yourself. So start planning your road trip of a lifetime today.

Discover the three main sites

The Cradle of Human Culture is rooted in three main archaeological sites in the Western Cape. These sites preserve some of the world's earliest evidence of the evolution of modern human behaviour



Diepkloof Rock Shelter, east of

Eland's Bay- contains some of the earliest evidence (dating back 60 000 years) of the human use of symbols, in the form of patterns engraved onto ostrich egg shell used as water containers. Diepkloof is unfortunately not open to the public, but there are many other surrounding historical and archaeological places to visit that link to this site, amongst which Eland's Bay Cave with beautiful rock paintings. Refer to the map.



Blombos Cave, on Blombosfontein Private Nature Reserve, close to Stilbaai, is where a small stone flake marked with intersecting lines of red ochre pigment (dated to around 73 000 years ago) was found. This artefact represents, what archaeologists have called, the oldest-known example of human drawing. Blombos Cave is unfortunately not open to the public, but a current exhibition at Iziko South African Museum explains its history and findings. Refer to the map.



Pinnacle Point, in Mossel Bay, - presents some of the oldest evidence of heat treatment of rock. The record from this world renowned archaeological site shows that humans were regularly eating seafood at about 162 000 years ago. Pinnacle Point is open to the public and offers tours with local guide Mr Christopher Jantjies or Dr Peter Nilssen. There are also many other surrounding historical and archaeological places to visit that link to this site. Refer to the map.

Cape Town 10s

IRB World Sevens Series

Few countries are as sports mad as South Africa and none are as obsessed with the rugby as we are. Apart from football, it is the most popular game in the country and the Cape Town leg of the IRB World Sevens Series brings the city to a grind halt for one weekend in December. Hosted at the Cape Town Stadium, the festival of rugby sees the world's best Sevens teams battle it out in front of a sell-out crowd. The home team is always in the running for the top prize winning the tournament in 2015, placing second in 2016 and third in 2017.

Cape Town Sixes

Held annually at the Green Point Cricket Club, the Cape Town Sixes was first staged in 2016 and it has already become a major fixture in the city's sports calendar. The format has a number of leagues, ranging from social to corporate, and is the perfect option for touring teams looking to take on some of the locals in a fun, vibey environment. If the cricket is not a big enough lure, the event has also added Five Futbol with three divisions to choose from, while there is plenty of entertainment to enjoy if your team suffers an early exit.

Offering surfers great conditions in every direction, virtually all year round, the Western Cape has point breaks and beach breaks, even giant reef breaks. It would take month to explore the options available to surfers on a road trip. Take a look at this five-day journey down the Garden Route to get you started and for the non-surfers in the family, never fear, there is plenty to keep you occupied.

Day 1

Cape Town

Named by Surf Magazine as one of the world's best surf cities, Cape Town is your first port of call on this trip. In truth, one day may not be enough with numerous spots around this great surf city to explore. There is something for everybody on this portion of the trip – from beginners to experts – with Muizenberg a great beach to learn the tricks of the trade with a number of surf schools lining the beachfront and beaches like Llandudno and Dungeons great options for the more experienced surfers.

For the none-surfers:

Cape Town is a city that caters to all sports lovers, with so many things to choose from. The Mother City has some of the best golf courses in the world, boasting world class facilities, and is also home to two of the most iconic sports stadiums on the globe – Newlands Rugby Stadium and Newlands Cricket Stadium – where the provincial and national teams are often in action. The annual IRB Sevens Series is held at the Cape Town Stadium in December and it has been hugely successful.

Outside of sport:

A foodie city and cultural hot spot, there is plenty to offer visitors outside of the sporting realm. Cape Town and surrounds boasts some of the best restaurants in the country, with the likes of The Test Kitchen and Chef's Warehouse frequently topping the awards, while the Zeitz Museum of Contemporary Art Africa in the Silo District of the V&A Waterfront has firmly established the city a cultural heavy-hitter.

Day 2

Stilbaai

Next up is the famous surf town of Stilbaai, a favourite amongst local surfers and visitors alike. This awesome town on the Garden Route has something for all levels of skill, with rookies enjoying the softer breaks of Lappiebaai, advanced surfers preferring the rocky Morris Point Cape above the Stilbaai Harbour and pros paddling out at the rough – yet spectacular – coast of Jongensfontein.

For the non-surfers:

Stilbaai is rugged beach town and like all the towns along this beautiful stretch of coast, it is incredibly beautiful and ripe for exploration. Hike or cycle along the coast from Stilbaai to Jongensfontein and enjoy the incredible views or take a walk in one of the three nature reserves: Pauline Bohnen, Geelkrans and Skulpiesbaai. You can also canoe, kayak or get some fishing done on the Goukou River if watersports is more in line. Stilbaai also has a magic nine-hole golf course with incredible ocean views from every tee.

Outside of sport:

Have a picnic or simply take a stroll down the gorgeous main beach, Lappiesbaai, which stretches for kilometres, visit the ancient fishing traps that are visible at low tide and were built by the Khoi-San around 3000 years ago or explore the historic buildings, the Palinggat homestead, that houses the tourism office, and Jagerbosch.

Day 3

Mossel Bay

With those in the know, Mossel Bay is right up there with Jeffrey's Bay and Outer Pool is arguably the town's most famous break. The town, which sits at the beginning of the Garden Route, is a great surf spot for old hands and those starting out, while there are a number of surf school so take advantage of for those in the family who have yet to give it a go. Other spots to explore include Inner Pool, Mystery Reef and Ding Dang.

For the non-surfers:

Pinnacle Point Beach and Golf Resort is home to one of the country's best golf resorts, so while the surfers in your group explore the breaks, you can explore the fairways and greens. The St Blaize Hiking trail is a long, but not too challenging, hiking trail with incredible views of the surrounding area, including the lighthouse and cave, and the local flora and fauna.

Outside of sport:

Discover the Point of Human Origins at the Pinnacle Point Caves with Dr Peter Nilssen. Providing the earliest evidence for modern human behavior, this is an experience not to be missed. Want to spot some game? Spot the endangered Cape Mountain Zebra and Black Harrier as they roam freely with Big Five game. Situated just 25kms outside Mossel Bay, Gondwana offers an authentic African game experience.

Day 4

Victoria Bay

Next up is the cosy Victoria Bay – or Vic Bay as it's known to the locals – just outside of George. This great surf spot is classic point break with an inside and outside section. The water here is also a lot warmer than Cape Town, so you may be able to brave it with a shorty – paddle out via the beach or jump off from the tidal pool / rocks at the end of the promenade.

Outside of surfing:

If you're more in the pitch of the green than the break of the surf, you're in luck, with George boasting some truly fantastic golf courses. Fancourt is considered one of South Africa's best courses – the facilities are world class and include a warm-up and practice area, while George Golf Club is also a fantastic course, albeit not quite as exclusive

as the Fancourt experience. Cycling is also a big deal in George with more than 1000km of MTB trails ready to be explored. George is also situated on the Cross Cape Cycle route – a recently launched route running from Plettenberg Bay to Stellenbosch.

Outside of sport:

Looking for some family fun? Lose yourself in the largest permanent maze in the Southern Hemisphere at Red Berry Farm near George. Offering a wide range of kid's activities from pony rides, bumper boards, bubble ball, paddle boats and cherry picking. Another fantastic family experience is the Outeniqua Power Van, which explores the beauty of the Outeniqua Mountains. This unique railway journey runs from the Outeniqua Transport Museum in George, travels upwards through six tunnels, natural forests and fynbos and culminates with epic views of the valley from the summit. The return trip includes a picnic about halfway down the track and ends back at the museum.

Day 5

Nature's Valley

End your trip in the gorgeous, and aptly named, Nature's Valley – just 32 minutes outside of Plettenberg Bay. With beautiful scenery and surfing conditions offering up beach break tubes, it is an epic location to finish your surfing journey along the Garden Route. Great, and uncrowded waves, and one of the most beautiful places on earth. Magic.

Outside of surfing:

For something quite unique, take a dip with the beautiful spotted gully sharks that gather in large groups during the summer months in the Nature's Valley gully. As you would expect in an area with such a name, there are some wonderful hikes in Nature's Valley with superb views wrapped in forest, fynbos and coastal settings. Spot a dolphin from 'the point' – a short but lovely hike – or keep an eye out for sea otters, bush pigs and even some leopard tracks. Nature's Valley estuary is a great spot for fishing – beautiful, safe and without the worry of waves hitting the rocks. Perfect for kids.

Outside of sport:

You find yourself in paradise, what better activities than exploring this piece of heaven. This is the perfect place for bird watching with the Afromontane Forest surrounding the valley, the boardwalk along the Groot River Trail and the path down to the pump house are the best spots. The valley is also a hot spot for orchids and there are a number of varieties to explore in the valley. Finally, sunsets here are beyond amazing. Take a picnic basket down to the beach, relax and enjoy the simplicity of Mother Nature.





What better way to evoke a sense of nostalgia and classic adventure than by taking a trip on a train? From 'Forgotten Routes' to a stream train voyage through a lush, green valley, you will get enjoy a remarkable journey by boarding something once thought to be left in the past, which has thankfully been granted a new lease of life.

Steam train to Elgin Market

Brought to you by the Ceres Rail Company, travel from Cape Town through lush valleys and the rolling green hills of the Cape Overberg to the beautiful Elgin Valley, stopping at the steam-punk themed Elgin Railway Market. Enjoy live music, a huge selection of food and drink, clothing stalls and art. The whole trip – including your time at the market – will last around 9 hours and you'll be back in the Mother City by 5.30pm.

Cost: R750 per Adult / R500 per Child / Infants under 2 - FREE

The Forgotten Route

Start your journey by bus from Cape Town to Worcester, before boarding the Trans Karoo train for the wonderful town of Matjiesfontein in the Cape Karoo. The train ride is only two hours, but the journey lasts two days, with activities including guided walks, a braai under the clear Karoo sky and a wine-tasting experience at a local olive estate. This route was once used by adventurers seeking their fortunes during the late 19th Century Gold Rush.

Cost: R1950 p/p/sharing with a maximum of 13 guests, bigger roups will be quoted on enquiry.

Diaz Express

Not so much a train trip, than a rail experience, the Diaz Express is still a spectacular journey. The coaches run through the gorgeous land-scapes of the Garden Route and Klein Karoo. Starting in Mossel Bay, the train's first stop is Seeplaas, a boutique coffee shop and art gallery with stunning views, and then it trundles on to either the Maalgate Bridge or the Glentana viewpoint (depending on your choice of route), where the train turns around. On the way back, the coach stops at the Great Brak River, where you can enjoy lunch at the award-winning Trans-Karoo Restaurant or the Opispoor Pub & Grill before heading back.

Cost: R150 for return ticket / R120 for children 12 and younger

#ReclaimTheRoadTrip via the Cape Karoo

Road-tripping the Western Cape is like no other place on the planet. This festive season go off the grid away from the hub of the cityscapes and explore the majesty of the Cape Karoo. Capture the joys of this regions with its open roads and many hidden stops and treasures in this 3 day journey of discovery.

Day 1

Head out along the N1, towards Matjiesfontein, your first stay-over on this road trip, but make sure you break up the drive with a pit-stop in the lovely town of Worcester, a gem of the Cape Winelands and the perfect place to stretch your legs.

Quick detour: Shop at the Fairhill Craft Co-operative

Around 15-20 minutes outside of Worcester is Rawsonville, home to the Fairhill Craft Co-operative. Shop for a variety of edibles and treats, gifts and locally handmade crafts.

There are also a number of great restaurants to choose from while in Worcester, with all offering something different:

The Barn Gallery and Café: If you have a taste for art and delicious food, this restored barn from the 1790's is a must. The café is also child-friendly.

Opstal Restaurant: For a gorgeous view of the valley – and a cracking fireplace if you make the trip in winter – Opstal is a fantastic venue to recharge before hitting the road again.

Continue on to Matjiesfontein:

Whether you are on a family road trip or a getaway for two, the charm of this beautiful old Karoo town manages to infect all that visit. Kids – and adults – will love the 'tour' of the town in the old London Double Decker bus (hint: it's known as the shortest tour in the world), while the historic buildings and Lord Milner Hotel speak to an age gone by. Enjoy a dinner of Karoo lamb and chase it down with a couple of brandies in the Laird's Arms Pub

Day 2

Next up on your whistle-stop tour of the Cape Karoo is Prince Albert – another gem of the region and a must-visit for all intrepid road-trippers. It's just under two-hour's drive, so plenty of time to enjoy an idle breakfast at the Lord Milner before departing.

You're going to want to spend the day in Prince Albert, so make a beeline for town, enjoying the drive along the way. Once in town grab early

lunch at:

Gallery Café: A local favourite, with some lovely dishes, we recommend the pork and pear starter, oxtail and lamb curry and the malva pudding.

Stargazing is a must when visiting anywhere in the Cape Karoo it only takes you to look up and view stars pinned against a black canvas. From open vast landscapes, to sunsets following open starry night skies. There are few place better to enjoy this than Prince Albert. Wrap yourself in some blankets and take in the majesty of the moment.

Day 3

Pack some food for the trip home and hit the road early. Take the scenic route via the Swartberg Pass – the historic pass built in the 1800s. With its highest point at 1585m above sea level, you will be blown away by the breath taking views of the Klein, and Great Karoo.

Quick detour: Ostriches

If you have the time, stop-over in Oudtshoorn for a Tractor Tour on Safari Ostrich Farm. This hour long activity allows for an "insiders" view on a working ostrich farm and replaced the Ostrich riding experiences aligning with international Responsible Tourism practises. It's something different and a great way to get the kids some fresh air before continuing on with the trip.
